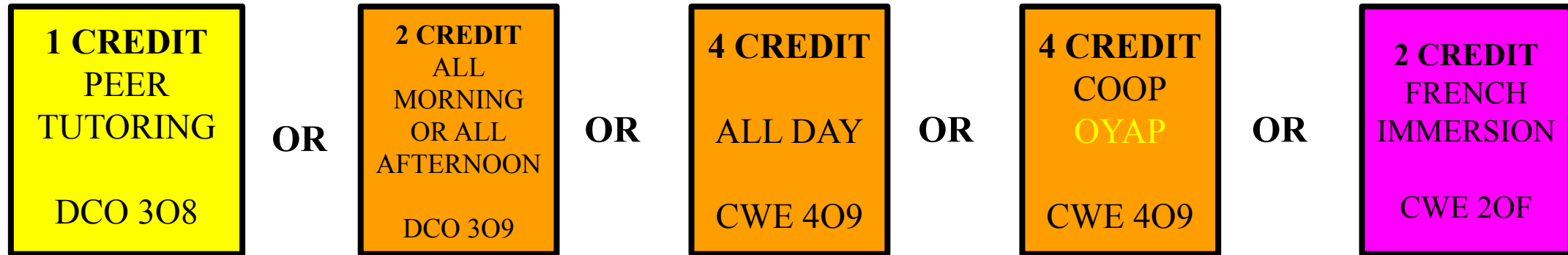
ENGLISH AS A SECOND LANGUAGE

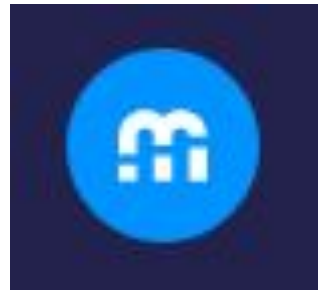

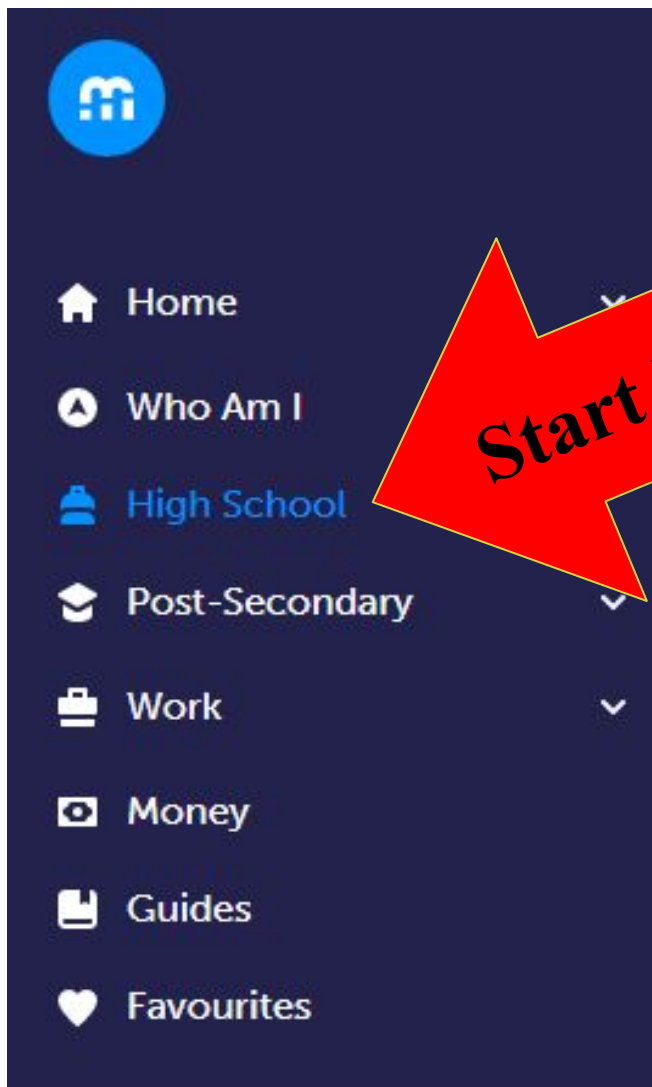

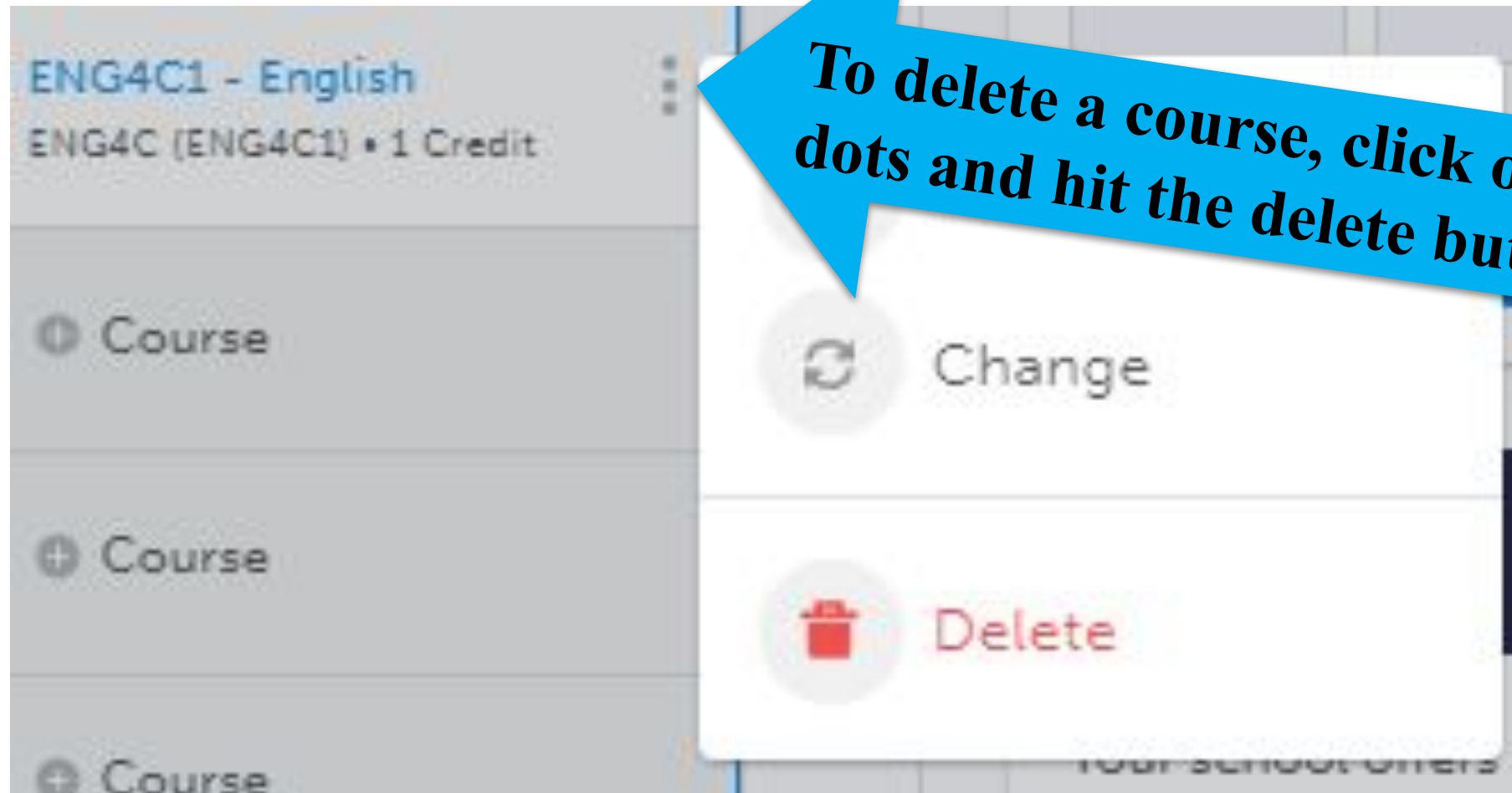
